
ORIENTATION

• Housing Information

- Information about on-campus housing options as well as off-campus housing resources.
 - The APC Dormitory is located on the 9th floor of the school building. Phase One (the left wing) is assigned exclusively for male residents/dormers, while Phase Two (the right wing) is for female residents/dormers. At the center of the two wings is the Dormitory Lounge Area which functions as a dining room and recreation area. This is where residents/dormers may watch cable TV, have their meals, or study in groups. Guards are available to provide 24-hour security service. Residents/Dormers observe curfew hours daily from 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.

o Amenities

Each dormitory room is air-conditioned and is good for three (3) people. Each room has one (1) toilet cubicle and one (1) shower cubicle that has hot and cold shower modes. The monthly rental includes the following: room with smoke detector/sprinkler, single-sized bed, mattress, side table, bookcase, clothes closet with lock, a drawer with lock, study table with chair, air conditioning, and 24-hour Internet connection.
